Mr. Tran and his family came to the United States from Vietnam by way of Thailand. The trip was long, at times exciting and at times a little scary. Mr. Tran was sixteen years old and didn't speak any English when he and his family arrived in San Francisco. They travelled from California to Manhattan, New York. They stayed for a while in Chinatown. There were other Vietnamese people living in Chinatown and it was comfortable. The family moved from Chinatown to Springfield, MA. Once again they lived near other Vietnamese people.

The family celebrates both American and Vietnamese holidays. The biggest Vietnamese holiday for them is Vietnamese New Year. They love pizza and hotdogs, but prefer rice to potatoes. They dress just like all Americans with the exception of Vietnamese wedding ceremonies. The ceremony is very traditional and calls for multiple 'costume' changes.

Mr. Tran works at Hasbro Games, in East Longmeadow. He has been employed there for eleven years. He says it is a good job most of the time. He takes his breaks and eats dinner with many of the other Vietnamese who work at Hasbro.

Mr. Tran has returned to Vietnam four times in the twenty-five years since he came to America. He likes to visit with relatives who still live there. He says Vietnam is a beautiful country, but America is his home.

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
